

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
# Let's help the world by living the Golden Rule

Something we've been talking about a lot in our house is how to help when we see unfair treatment. Maybe you've felt treated unfairly before—like by an older brother or sister. Or maybe you've seen people treated unfairly because they look or seem different. One thing a lot of people are becoming more aware of right now is that there is a pattern of not-nice treatment of people of color, especially Black people. This isn't fair, but it's been happening for such a long time that many people do it without even realizing it.

This unfair treatment happens all over: in our schools, in sports, in our towns, and many other places, too. It is called systemic racism. But we don't need to accept it as normal. So our family wanted to think about what we can do to change things. How we can pray.

We thought of a rule that can help us. Not a rule like "Wash your hands before dinner." This is actually a rule that people all over the world know and follow. It's called the Golden Rule. It's in every religion—sometimes said in different words, but always with the



same meaning. In the Bible it's written this way: "Do to others as you would have them do to you" (Luke 6:31, New International Version). Basically, this means that we should treat others the way we want them to treat us. Jesus taught us how to do this, and we can follow his example of treating others with love, understanding, fairness, and compassion.

Here's one example of how Jesus lived what he taught. One time, he talked to a Samaritan woman, even though Jesus was a Jew, and Jews and Samaritans didn't get along and often didn't treat each other very nicely. But Jesus didn't care that the woman was different, or a person he wasn't supposed to like. He loved people no matter what, because he knew that's what God, Love, causes each of us to do. God knows us all as His dear children, and Jesus showed that we can see each other that way, too. Through his love, he lived the Golden Rule.

Imagine how cool it would be if we all lived the Golden Rule—no one being bullied because of the color of their skin, and no one being a bully to anyone else. Living the Golden Rule is a way of praying that can help anyone who's being treated unfairly. It means being your best self—the way God made you, reflecting all of His goodness—and seeing the best self of everyone else, too.

This isn't always easy. It can take work to be sure we are always being fair and loving just like Jesus. But God is always there to give you the right thoughts and actions, and will show you how to love in just the right ways.

You can help make sure the world is safe and fair for everyone by listening to God, seeing others the way God sees them, and expressing love no matter what. Our family is committed to doing this. Will you join us? •

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#### 24/7!



id you know that you're just like your Father? I don't mean you're just like the man you call Daddy or Dad. But like God—your real Father—as it says in the Bible.

RED = STOP.

YELLOW = WAIT AND LISTEN.

GREEN = GO WITH THE BETTER IDEA.

A better idea is always one that matches up with the goodness in us—the goodness that's from our Father, good.


My friend liked these ideas. I found out that his teacher saw him making progress in class. He was learning how to make better choices instead of just getting angry.

# The first time I prayed for myself

One Saturday my family had plans to go bowling, but that morning I woke up with a stomachache. I wanted to eat but I wasn't hungry, and nothing tasted good. I just felt uncomfortable.

I told my mom how I was feeling. She reminded me about what I'd learned in the Christian Science Sunday School: that God loves me so much, and that because He loves me so much, I didn't need to be afraid. God's love would heal me. My mom said she would pray for me, and I went upstairs to take a nap.

When I woke up from my nap, I remembered something else I'd learned in my Sunday School class. I'd learned I could pray for myself. I decided to give it a try. My teacher had told us to take a piece of paper and draw a line down the middle. She'd said to write down on the left-hand side of the paper all the things that are wrong. So I wrote down things like "My stomach hurts." "I am hungry, but I can't eat anything." "I really want to go bowling with my family, and I'll be so sad if I can't go!"

Next she'd told us to write down on the right-hand side of the paper, across from each problem, a spiritual fact—something about God and God's perfect creation—that addressed that problem. I

thought about the ideas I'd learned in Sunday School that could help.

Across from "My stomach hurts," I wrote, "God is All-in-all." I knew that God is All, the only power! So it wasn't possible for my stomach to hurt, because nothing else besides God can have any power.

Across from "I am hungry, but I can't eat anything," I wrote down one of Jesus' Beatitudes: "Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled" (Matthew 5:6). To me, this meant that God would not leave me hungry. It was normal and

natural to eat lunch, so I could trust God to help me be able to eat comfortably.

Across from the third point, I wrote, "God is my Father-Mother." I knew that as my Father-Mother, God was giving me everything good. So it made sense that I could participate with my family in a joyful activity like bowling.

The last step of what I learned in Sunday School is really important: You tear the paper in half, straight down the line you drew in the middle of the page. You take the left-hand side of the paper (which has all the problems listed on it) and throw it in the trash. And then you have only the right-hand side of the paper, where you can see all the spiritual facts, which are true. This reminded me that I could toss out any bad thoughts about me—because God wasn't giving those to me—and stick with the good ideas from God that I'd been praying with.

Shortly after throwing away the list of problems, I felt perfectly well. I went downstairs, ate a sandwich, and then went bowling with my family. I was totally healed!

This experience taught me that knowing what's true—and staying with it—is a powerful way we can each pray for ourselves. ●

One time a friend got mad at me and said something mean. Then I got mad at him and said something mean back. Afterward, I felt very sad.
